The Tunncliffe lab had an active Fall with many changes:


*Giulia Rossi defended her thesis and left for a PhD at Guelph. In the process, she submitted a manuscript to Marine Ecology Progress Series on the reproductive and physiological consequences for vent mussels that live in pH as low as 5.5.

*Dr. Verena Tunncliffe had a great month at sea in the Mariana Backarc with a brand new remotely operated vehicle and new hot vent discoveries.

*Jon Rose finished 15 years as Lab manager, his grand finale was to ship the majority of the Hot Vent collection (some 3500 bottles) to Scripps in California for permanent accession and universal access.

*Ryan Gasbarro is working on a manuscript describing the wall fauna of Douglas Channel– the complex fjord that all those tankers would transit their loads of bitumen from the Northern Gateway Pipeline.

*Dr. Rachel Boschen and Dr. Verena Tunncliffe are participating in an international group providing advice to the UN's International Seabed Authority on designing regulations around seabed mining in the high seas.




Open to undergraduate and graduate students with strong interest in cancer research, this event offers a unique opportunity to discover the various training opportunities offered by IRIC researchers.

By submitting your application, you could be invited for a 3-day event at the IRIC, on the campus of the Université de Montréal, on June 15-18, 2017.

Reimbursement of travel expenses (up to \$500.00) hotel accommodation for 3 nights, meals and a STM Access Card valid for 3 consecutive days of unlimited travel through the Montréal public transit system will be included for all participants.

Valhalla Wilderness Society

The Valhalla Wilderness Society would like to invite you to a film screening of the new film, *Primeval: Enter the Incomappleux* hosted by UVic's Environmental Law Group.

Filmed by award-winning filmmaker Damien Gillis (*Fractured Land, Oil in Eden*) on location deep in the heart of BC's Selkirk Mountains, *Primeval* is the story of the majesty, magic and endurance of one of the world's last truly intact temperate rainforests – the incomparable Incomappleux.

Following an expedition of conservationists, biologists and wilderness explorers, Gillis documents the nature and history of this unique place – replete with 1,800-year-old trees and rare lichens – along with a plan to preserve it through a new provincial or Canadian park, the Selkirk Mountain Caribou Park proposal.

Visiting the Incomappleux is 'like going back in time', as expedition member Sean Elkins observes, to a forest that has been growing continuously since the last ice age – utterly untouched by the hand of man. But in recent decades, most of the ancient rainforests in the Incomappleux Valley have been logged. The magnificent core that is left has been spared only by the hard work of a small band of defenders and remains under threat to this day.

Public access to the ancient forest has always been difficult, but in recent years, bridge and road washouts have closed it to all but a handful of hardy adventurers who could backpack there. Few people have seen it since.

Now, after a Herculean filmmaking expedition, with *Primeval*, you are invited to experience the Incomappleux for yourself in all its splendour.

Wild ARC Practicum Program 2017

Looking to gain hands-on experience with wildlife? Interested in exploring a career in wild animal rehabilitation? Complete a Wild ARC summer practicum!

Practicum participants volunteer full-time under the supervision of wildlife rehabilitators to perform animal husbandry duties and medical treatments. Some of the skills participants acquire include species identification, cage set-up and proper husbandry technique, animal handling, tube feeding, dosage calculations, administering medication, performing lab work, data analysis, and various other procedures. The practicum program also involves spending time working with and mentoring volunteer team members. Participants should have prior experience in animals handling and husbandry.

Practicums are intensive two-month placements during one of the following periods:

May to June; July to August; September to October.

All practicum positions are voluntary – no stipend or salary is offered. Housing and transportation are the responsibility of the individual applicant. Please note that Wild ARC is not on a public transportation route. Participants not completing practicum for course credit will register for IWRC's Practicum Certification.
